Assisting the Board of Education with school business are the central office secretaries: Mrs. Vaughn (seated), Mrs. McGee and Mrs. Gallagher.

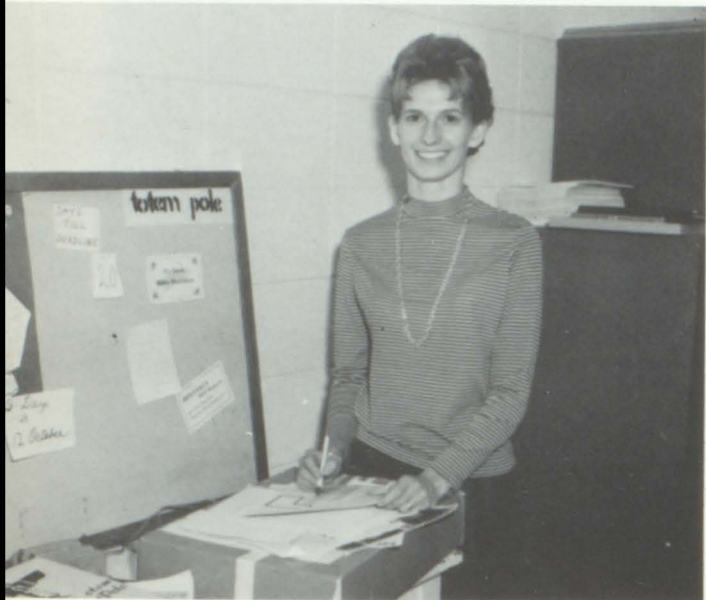

Mrs. Feinstein, a new member of the faculty, lectures on grammar to one of her English I classes. She is a sponsor of the freshman class.

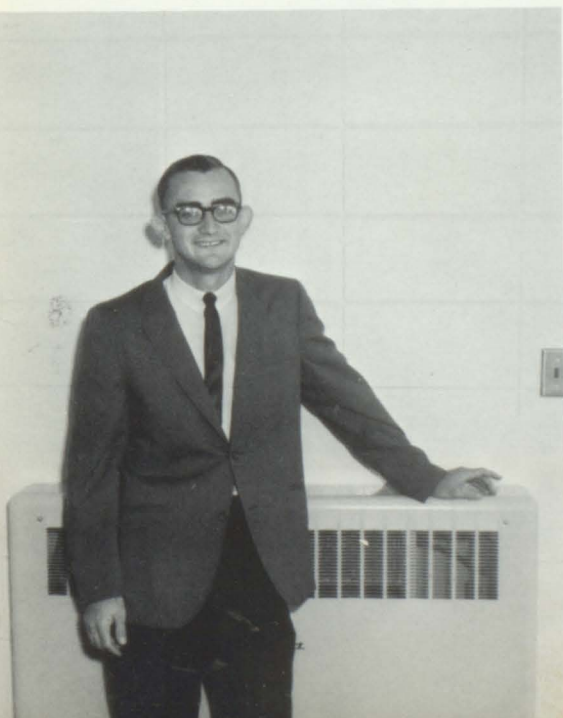

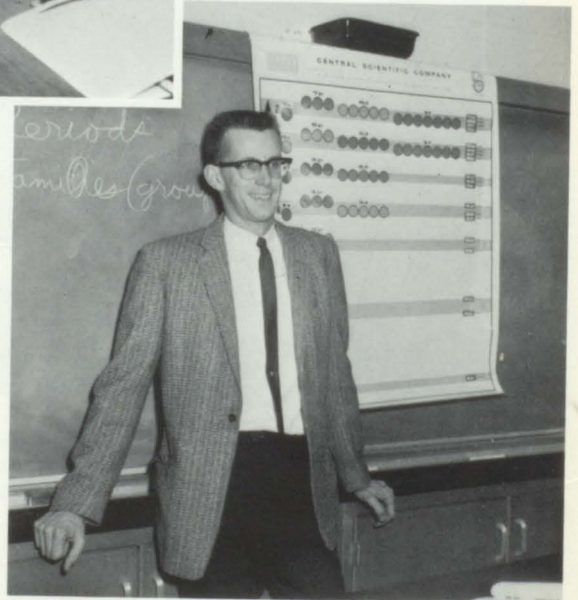

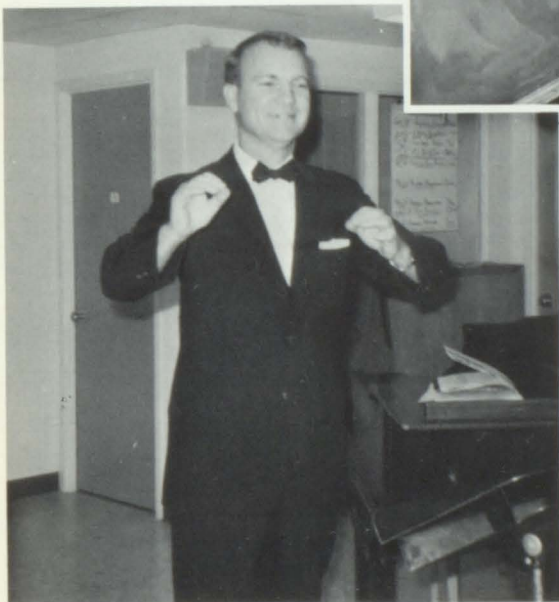

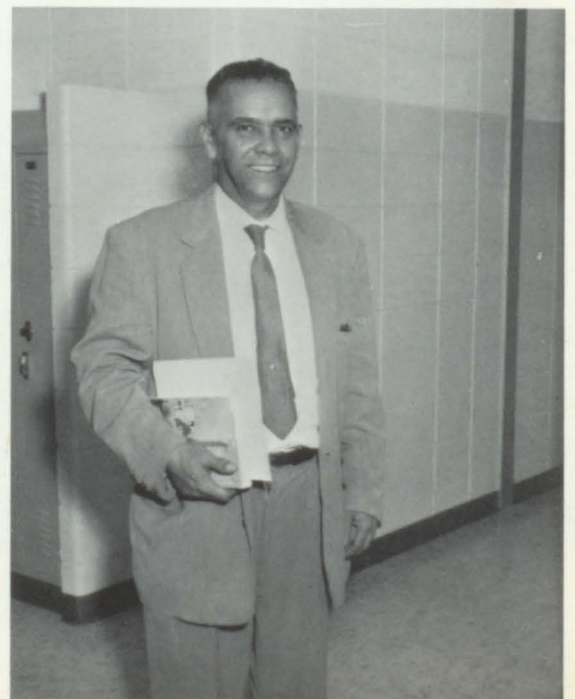

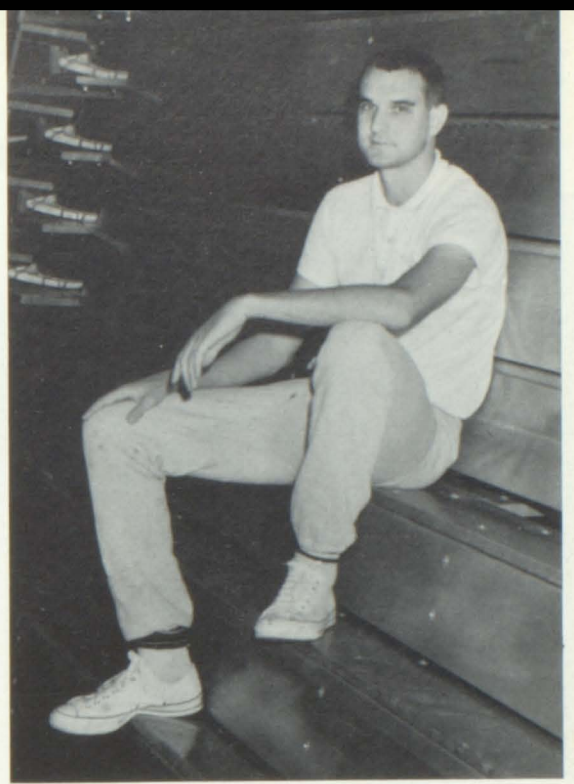

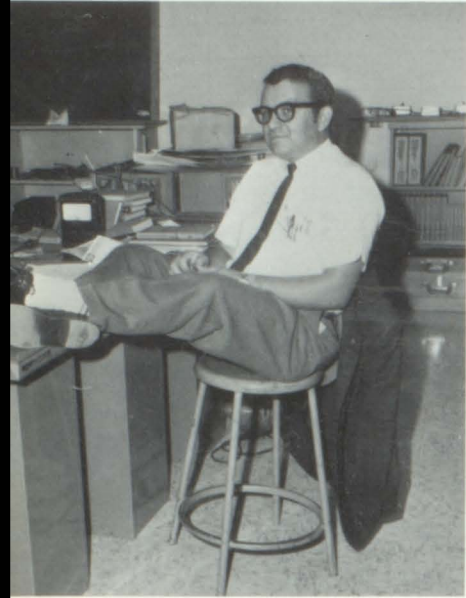

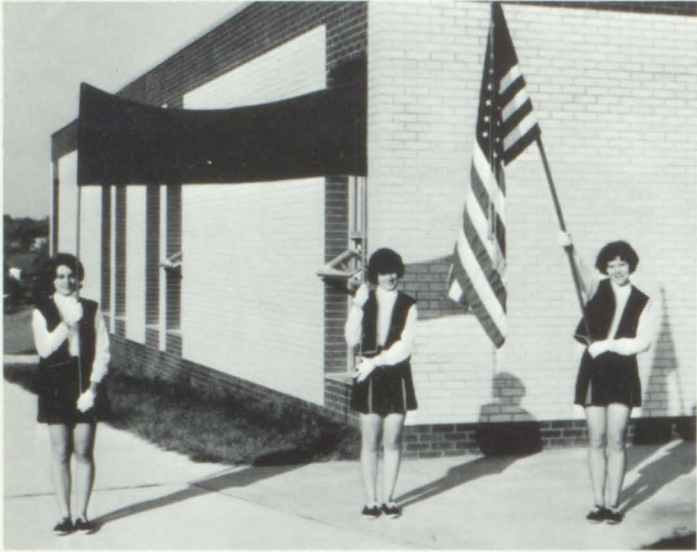

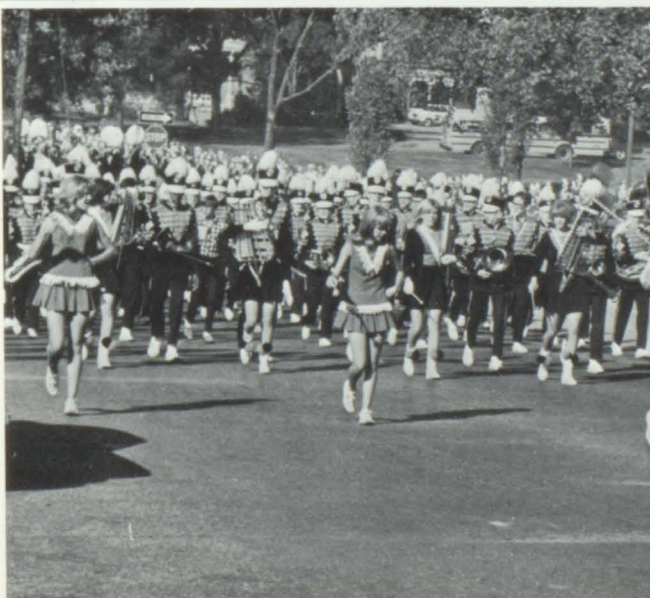

The cheerleaders not only supported the B-team, but also attended many of the freshman games.

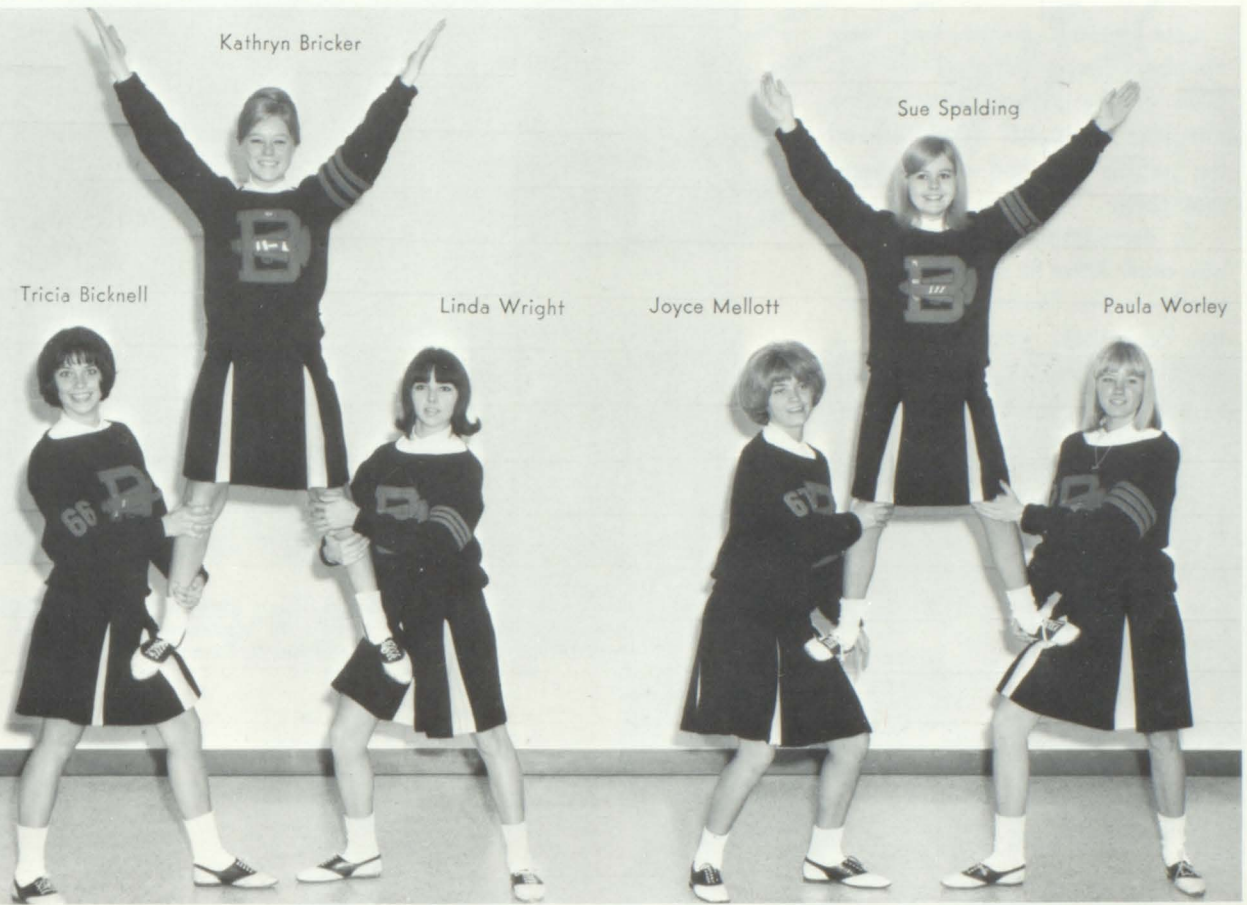

B-Club's annual paper drive is one of the ways B-Club raised its funds. Taking care of the concession stand during one basketball game added to their budget.



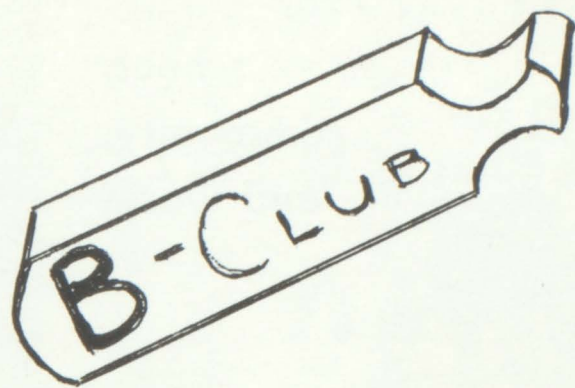

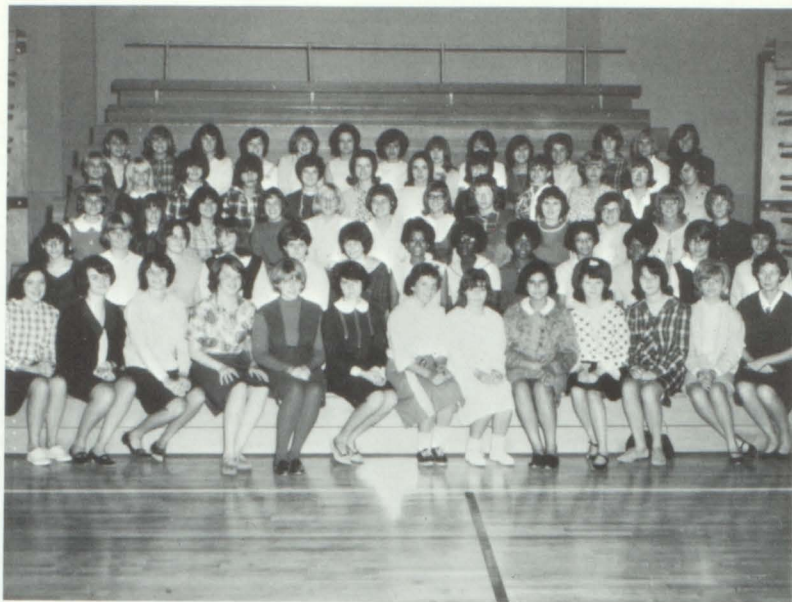

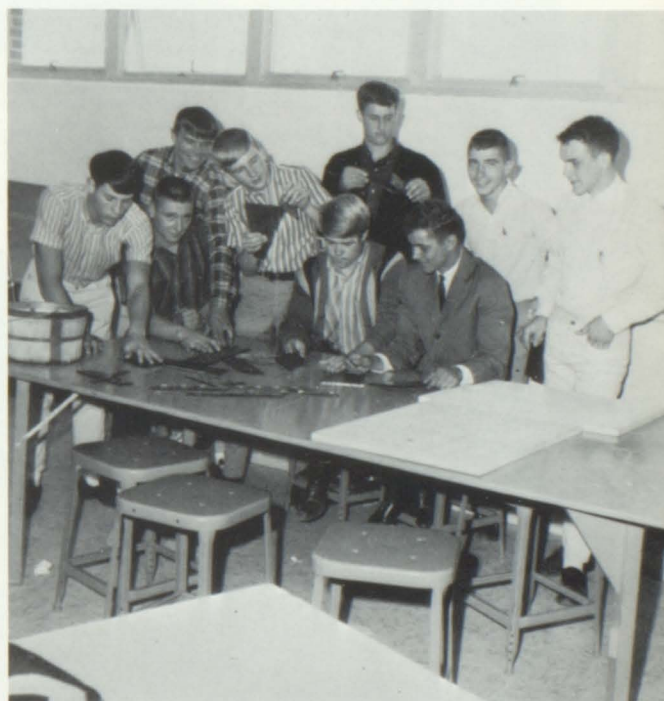

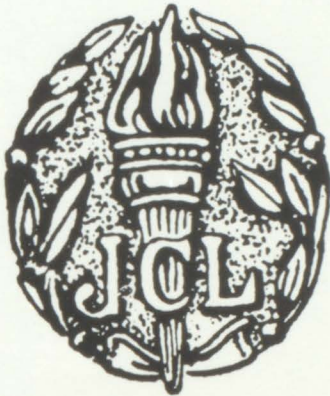

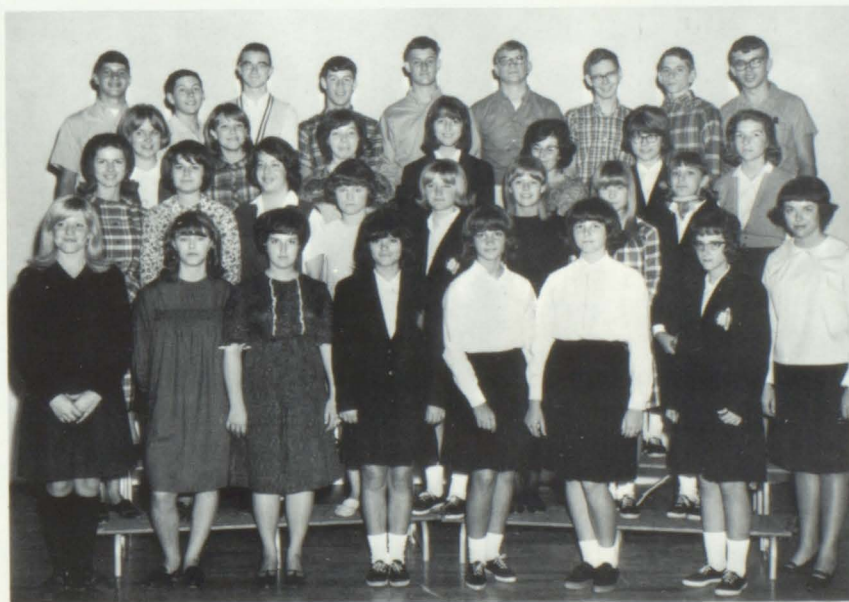

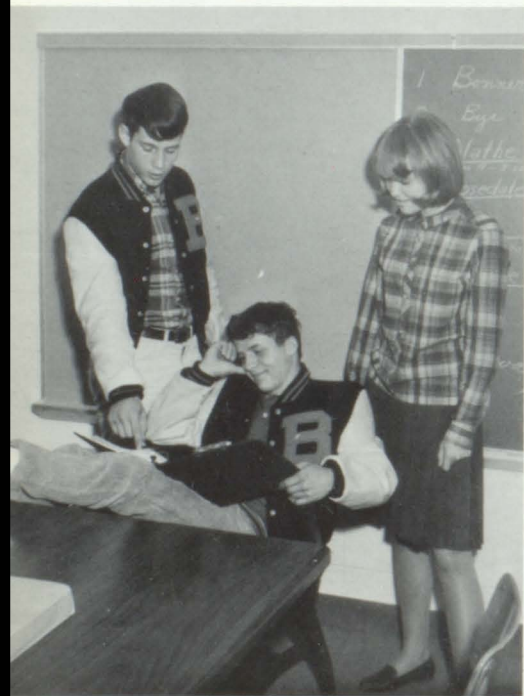

Besides sponsoring many new and old projects the Student Council provided the school with a dress code.

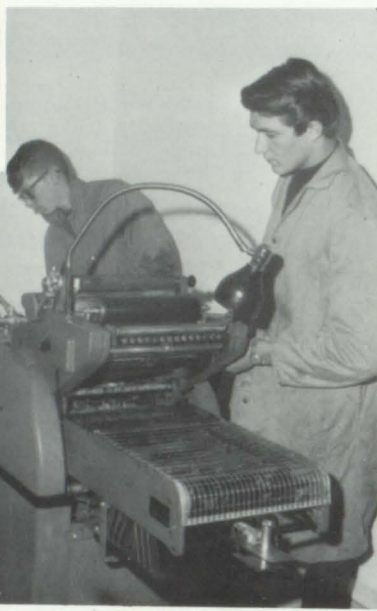
THE POW WOW

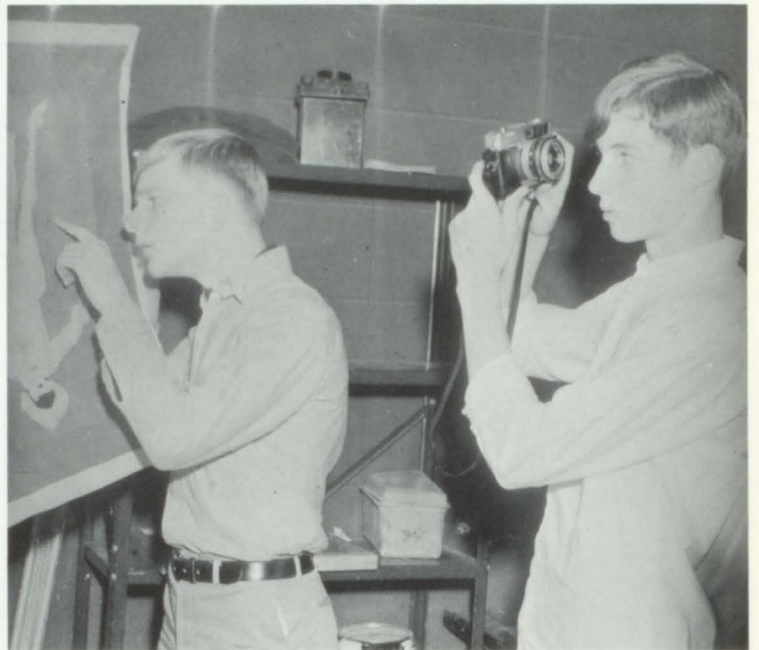

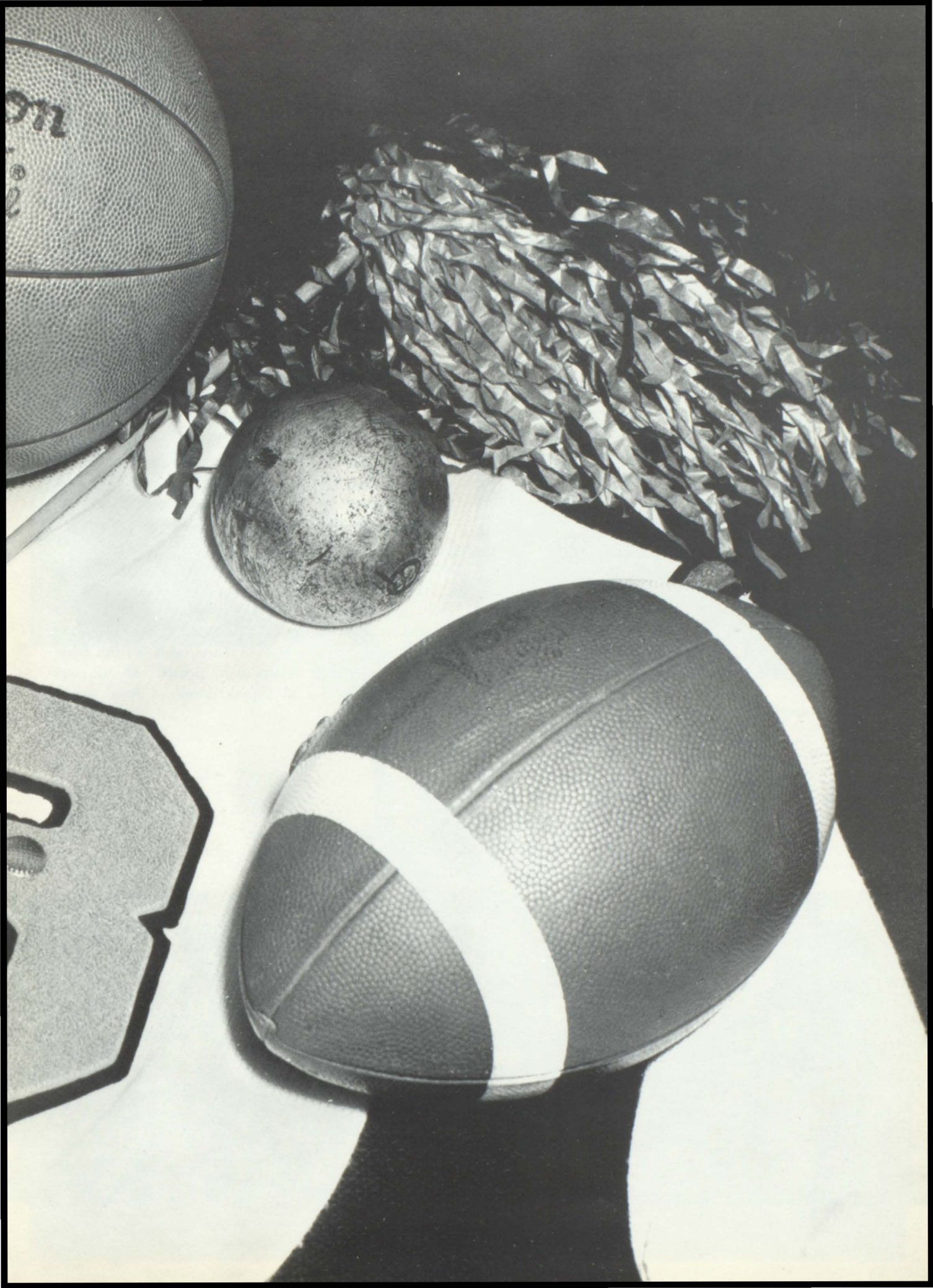

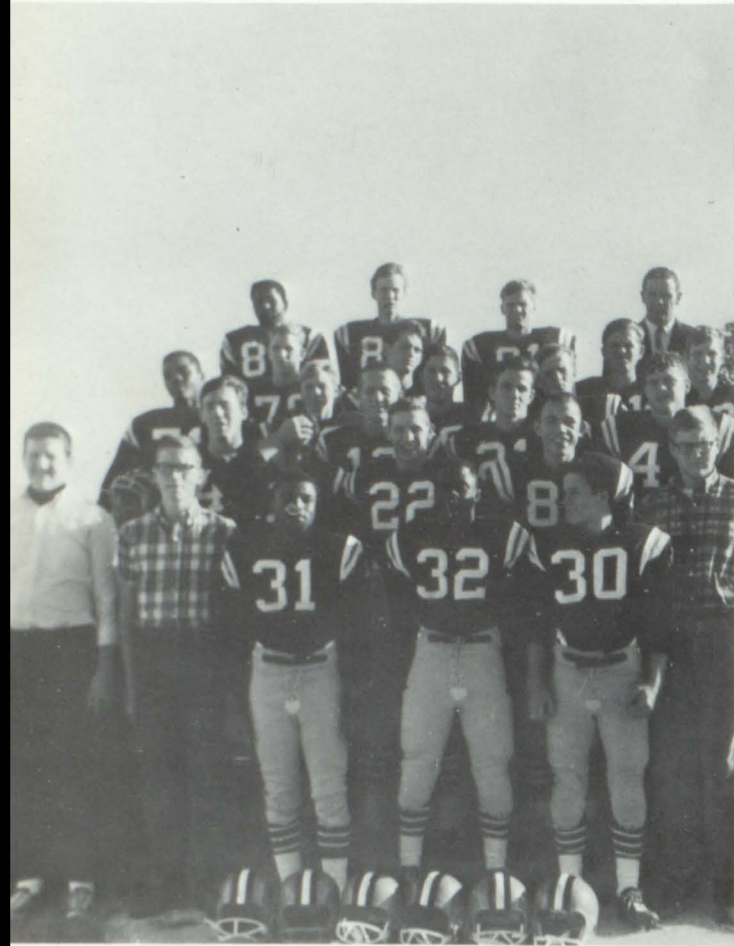


FOOTBALL

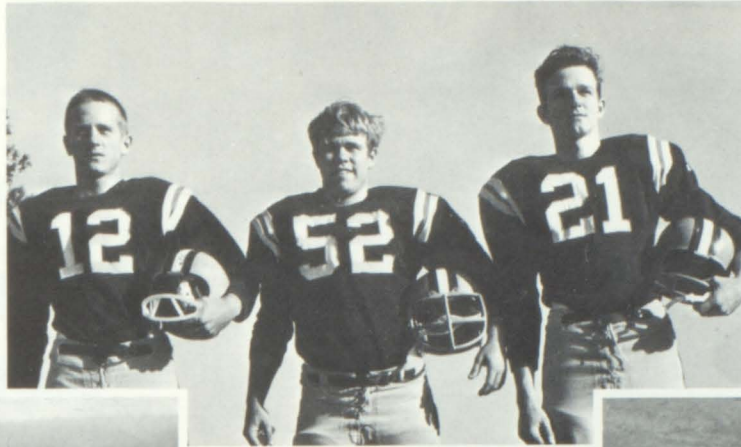

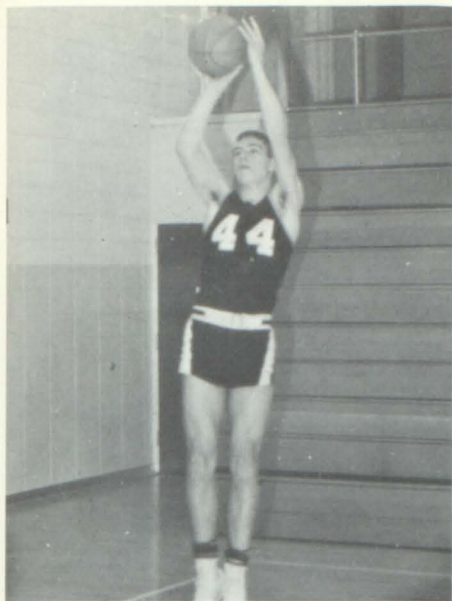

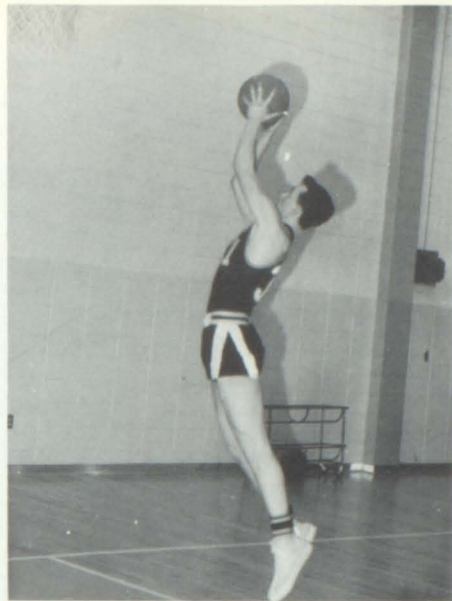

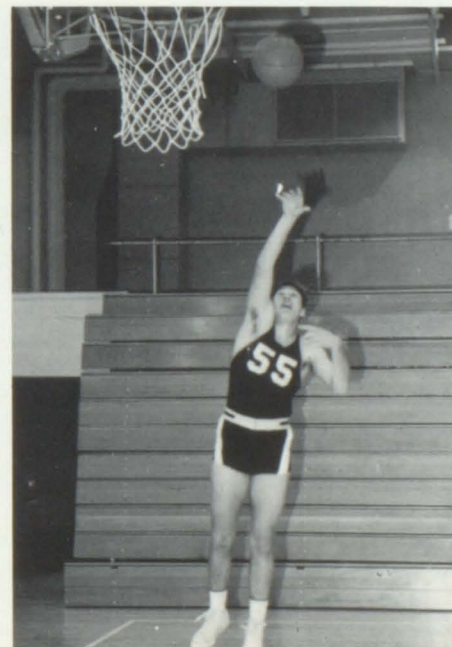

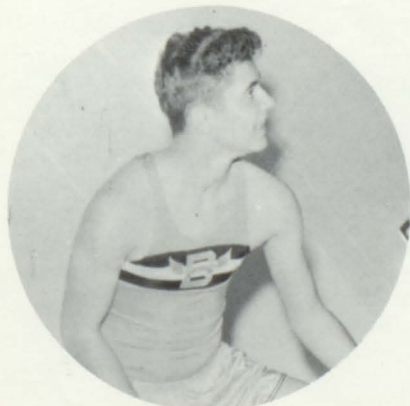

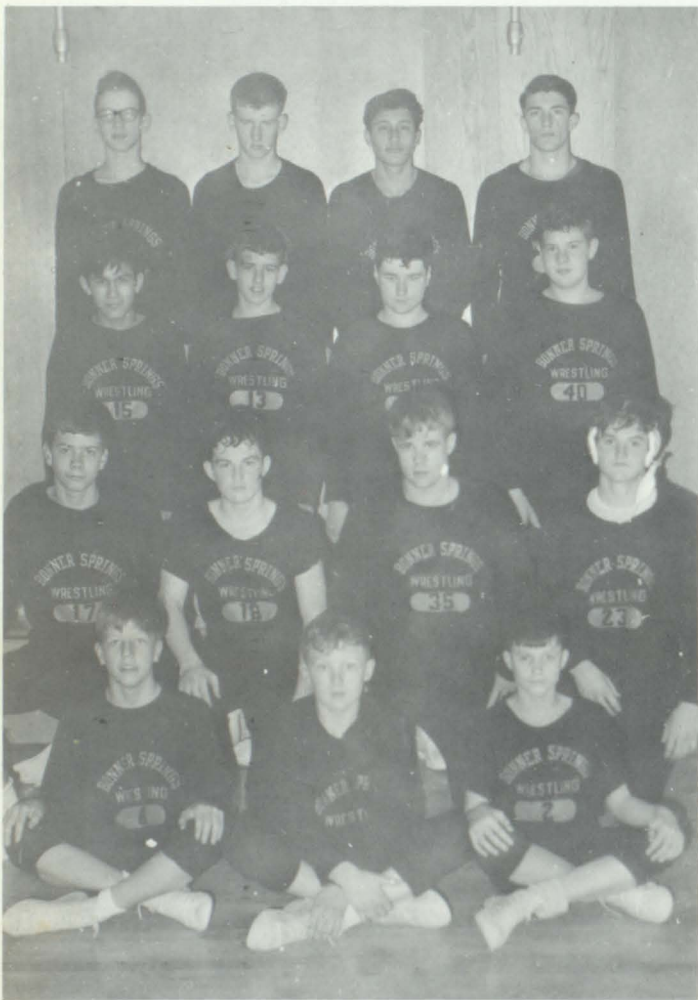

The season was filled with many highlights, but the Braves reached their peak on the evening of January 20th when they invaded the home mat of the Kansas School for the Deaf. The Bonner wrestlers blanked their opponents 52-0, collecting 7 pins, 4 decisions, and a forfeit.

Three of the most outstanding matmen for Bonner in the first year were Ron Hamilton, Dave Langford, and Lloyd Ford. Hamilton ranked 2nd in the District, 3rd in the Regional, and placed 2nd over all the state of Kansas in his 112 lb. class. Langford placed 4th in both District and Regional, and tied for 5th in the State tourney in the 180 lb. class. Ford won the gold medal at District, took 2nd in the Regional, and tied for 7th in the State in the 95 lb. class.

There were only two seniors on the varsity squad this year, so bigger and better things are expected from an experienced squad next year.

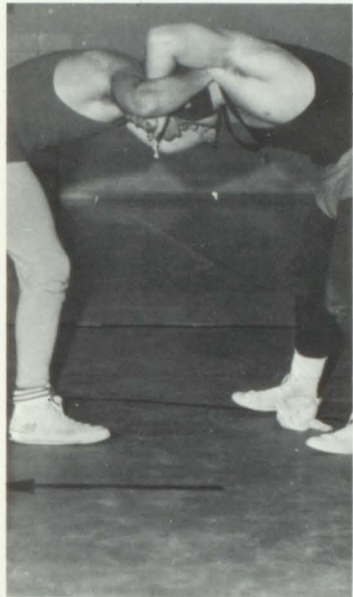

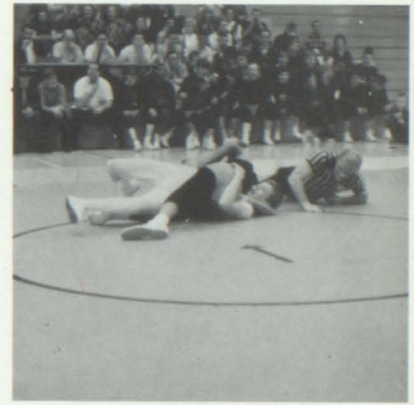

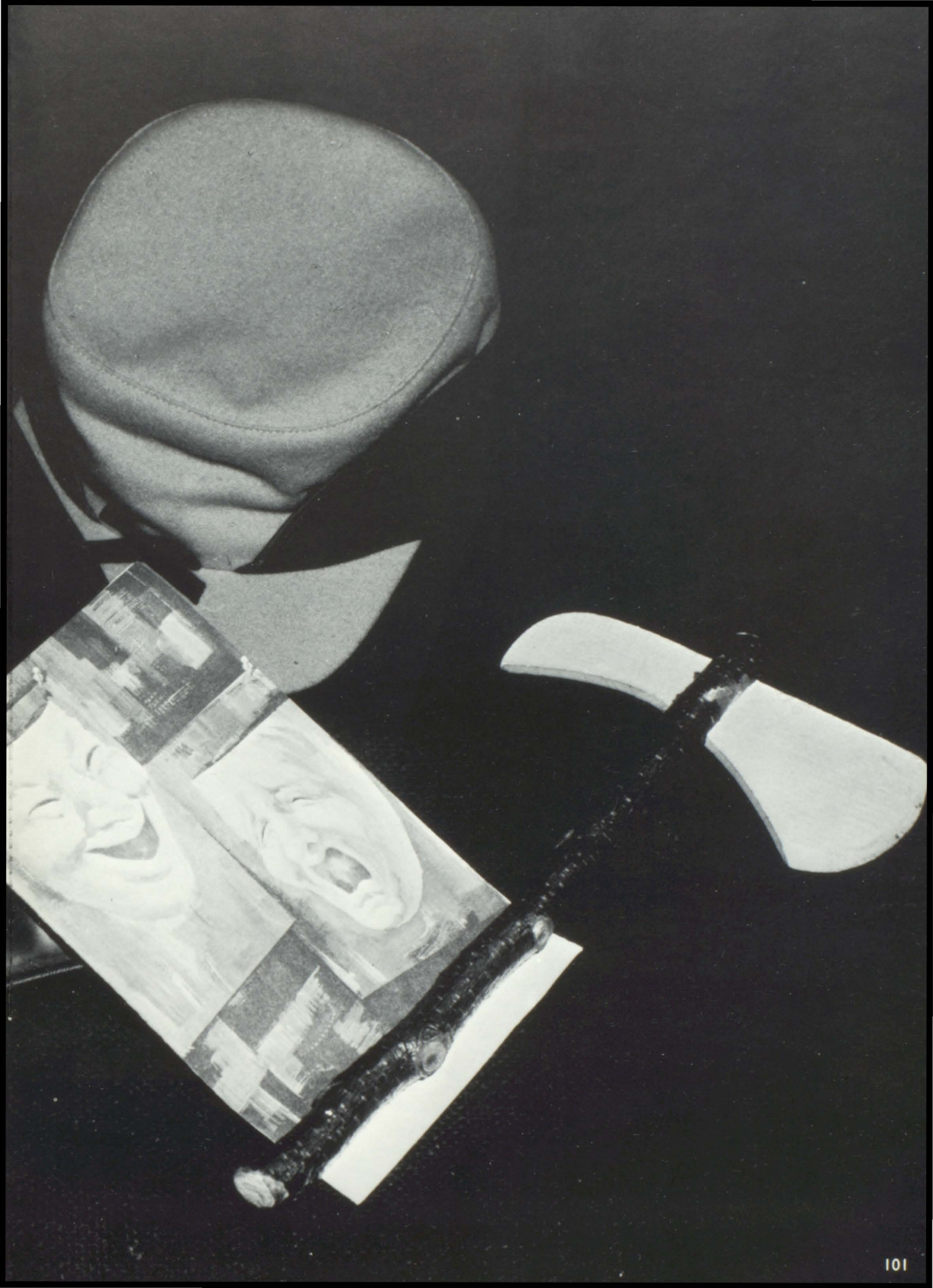

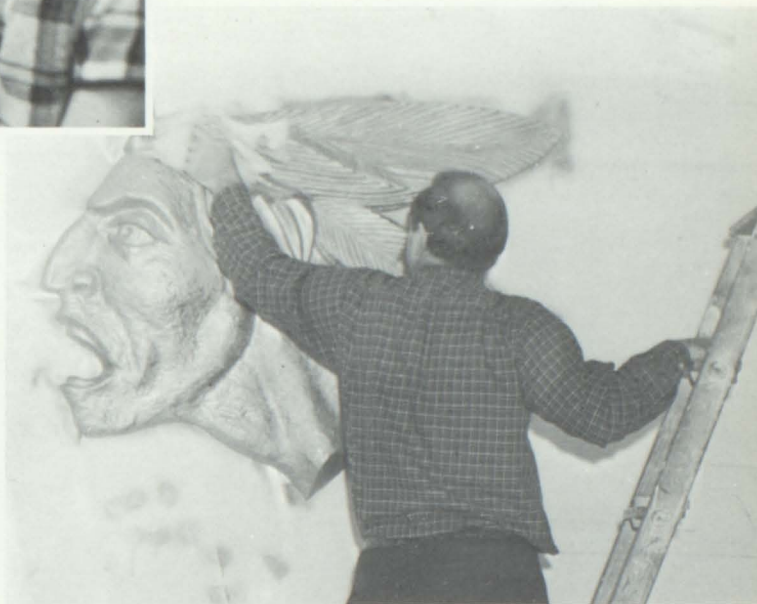

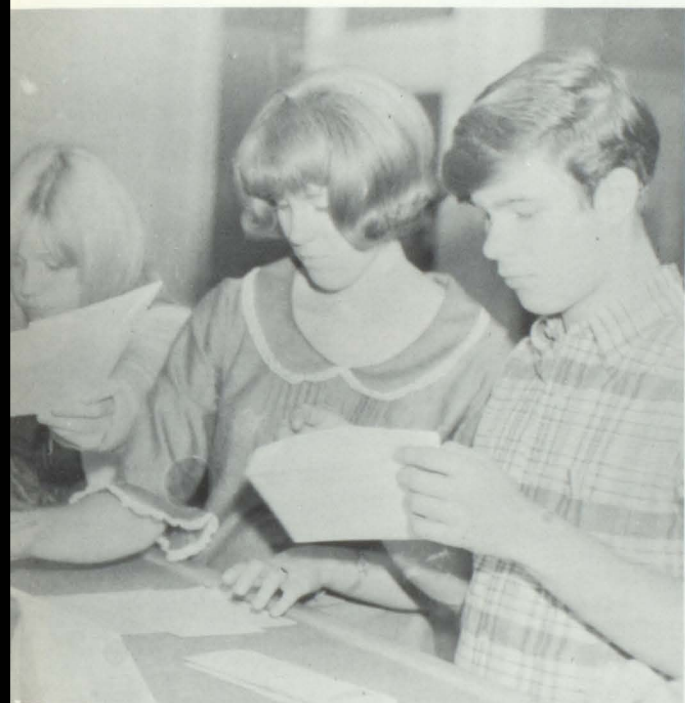

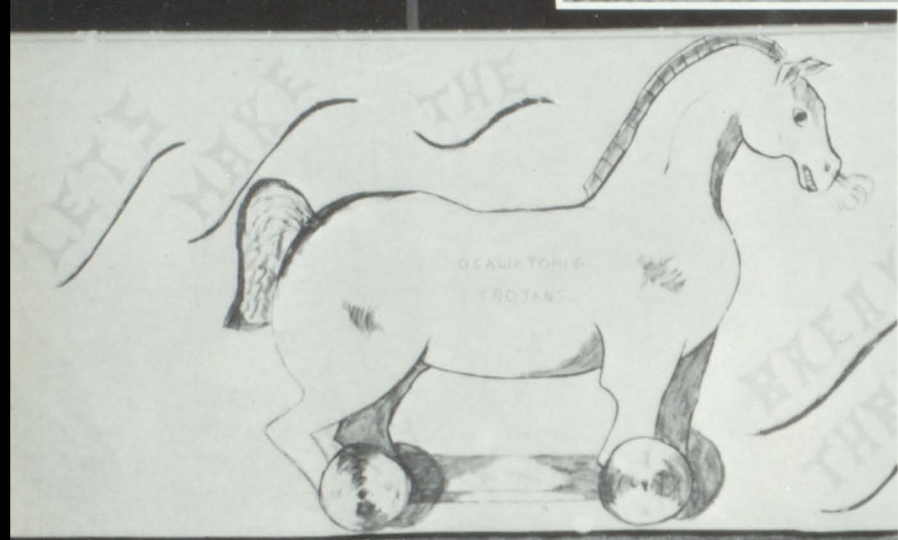

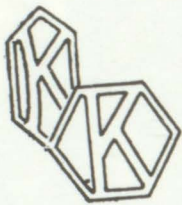
KAY-KAYETTE CONFERENCE

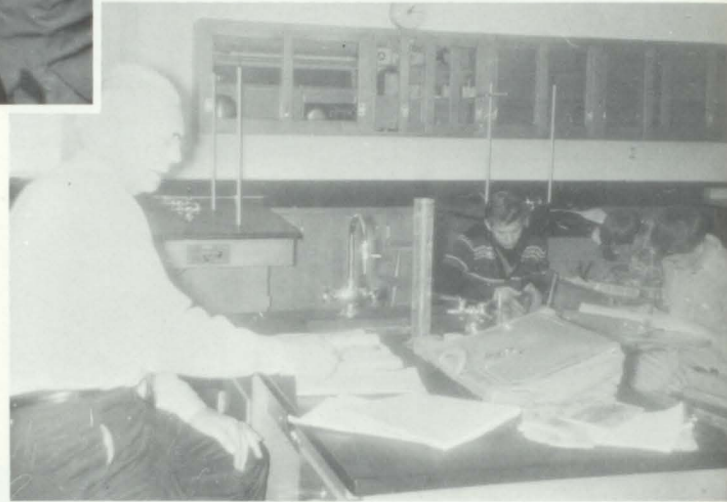

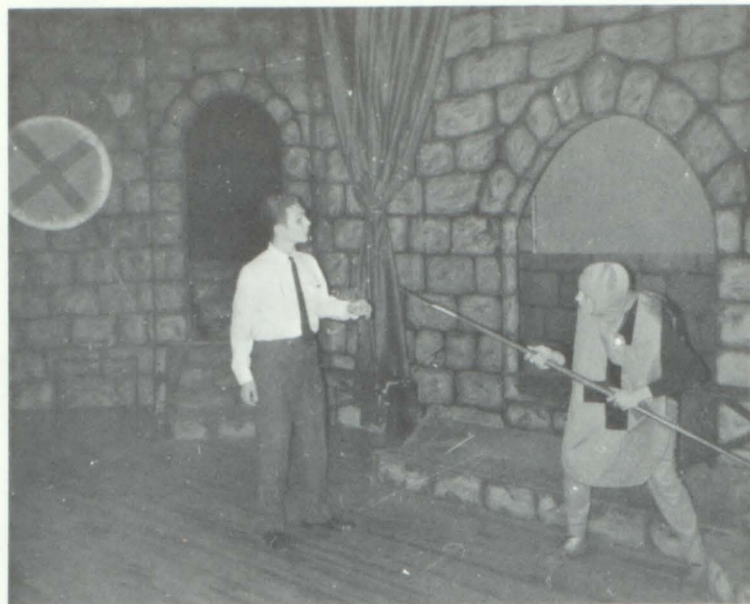

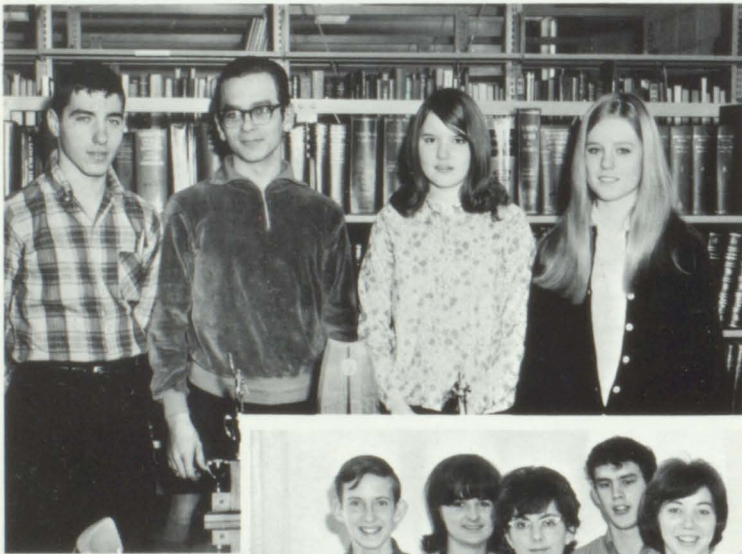
