We of the TOTEM POLE staff and the class of '69 present a record of our accomplishments and the NEW IMAGE OF THE BRAVES.



















## FACULTY.

This year a bond election took place which gave approval to the remainder of their plans—a stadium, a quarter-mile track, practice fields and facilities for physical education which include softball diamonds, a soccer field and tennis courts. When these facilities are finished, Bonner Springs High School will be a complete unit, comparable to any high school in the state of Kansas.














## Students Make Special Achievements






#### Unsung Heroes. . .



Mastering the lighting board looks like a job that only an experienced electrician can do—but Kirk Scheidt mastered it and was our technician at school assemblies and plays.


## .We Distinguish Them



## Homecoming Brings Victory



























### Basketball Co-Championship




