

As a faculty member, he was chosen to design the shop area of the new building.


As a member of the community, he has conducted football, baseball and wrestling programs for the younger athletes.

# "Often The Faces Speak What Words Could Never Say"





# "Homecoming. . .We Danced, Ate, Laughed –And It Was Over."










































Faculty












