# A Time Of Change

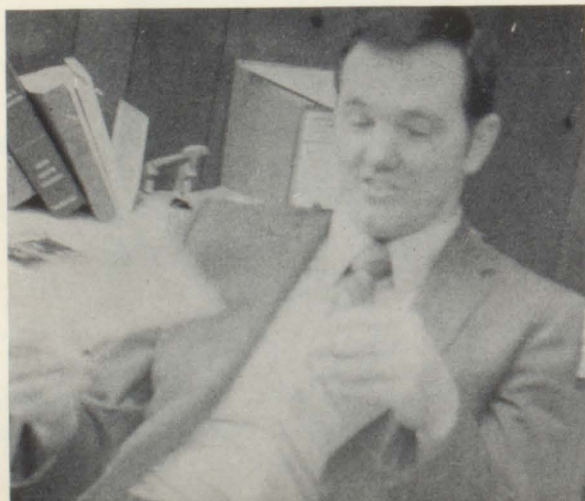

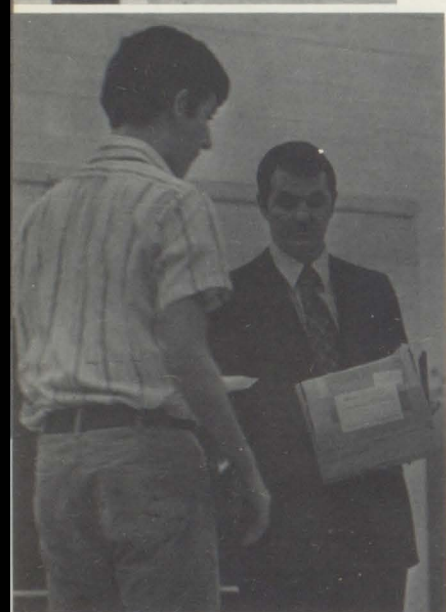




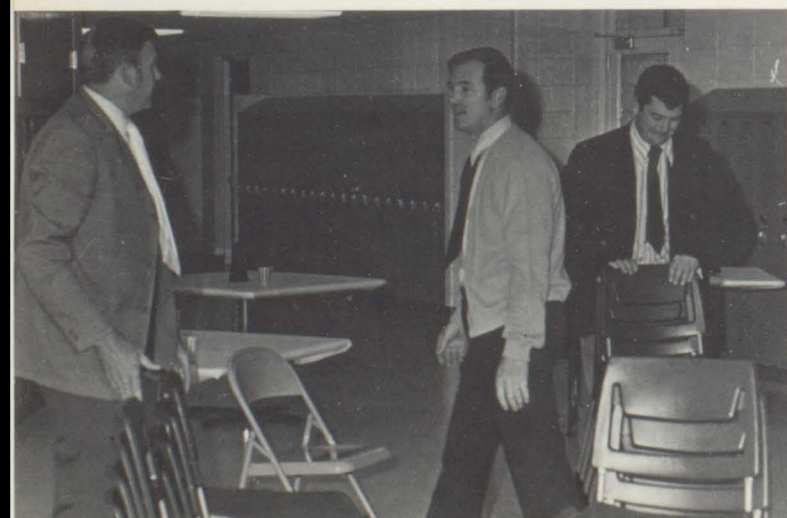

He has kept up with 'time and with change' and because he has, he has made real and lasting contributions to our school and its image in the past four years.



Bonner's Image is brighter than ever before, thanks to you, Mr. Don Stokesbury.



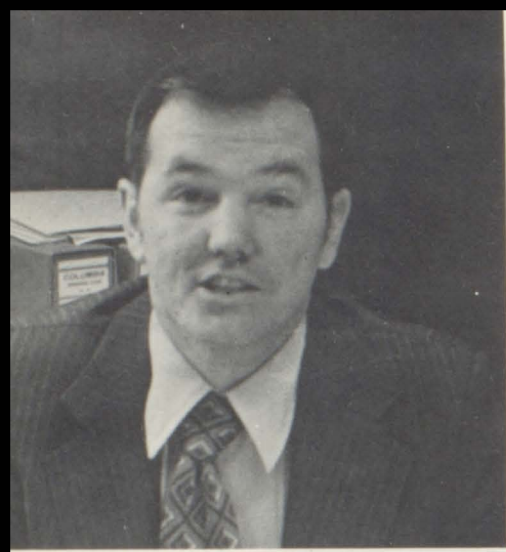
# FACULTY

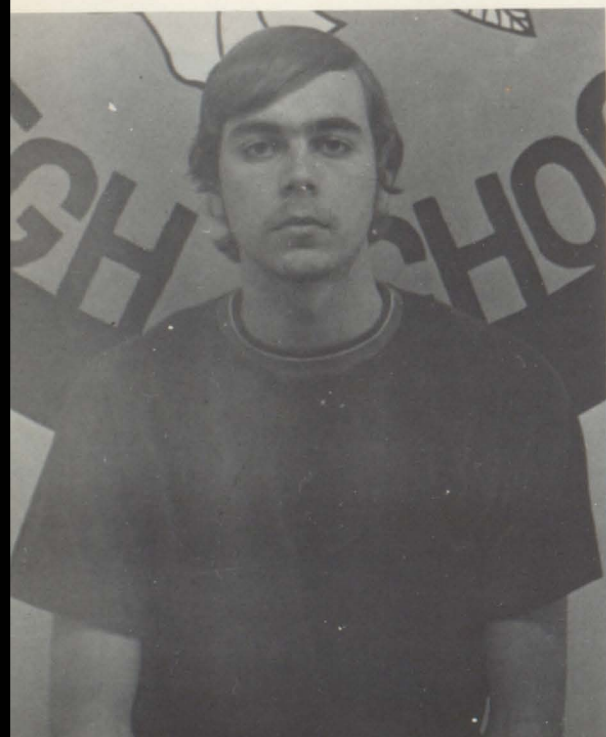
## Injun Joe

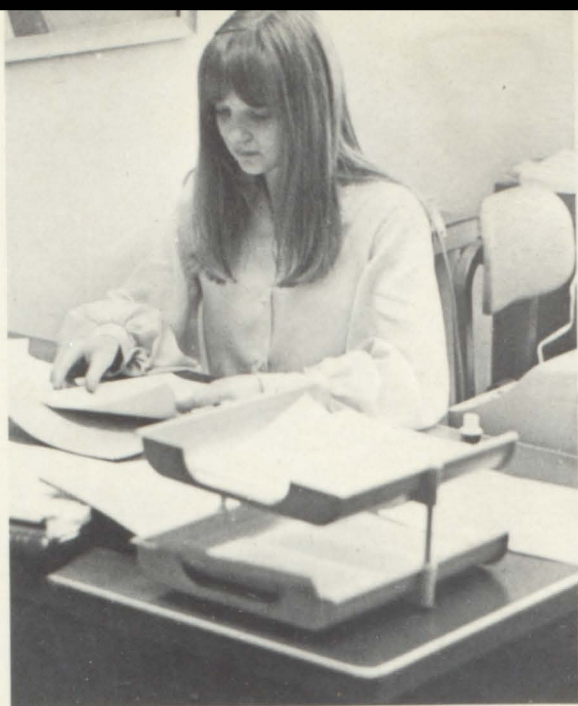

The Secretarial Training Program is in its 7th year. This year the number of girls placed in offices in the Bonner Springs area has increased to sixteen.

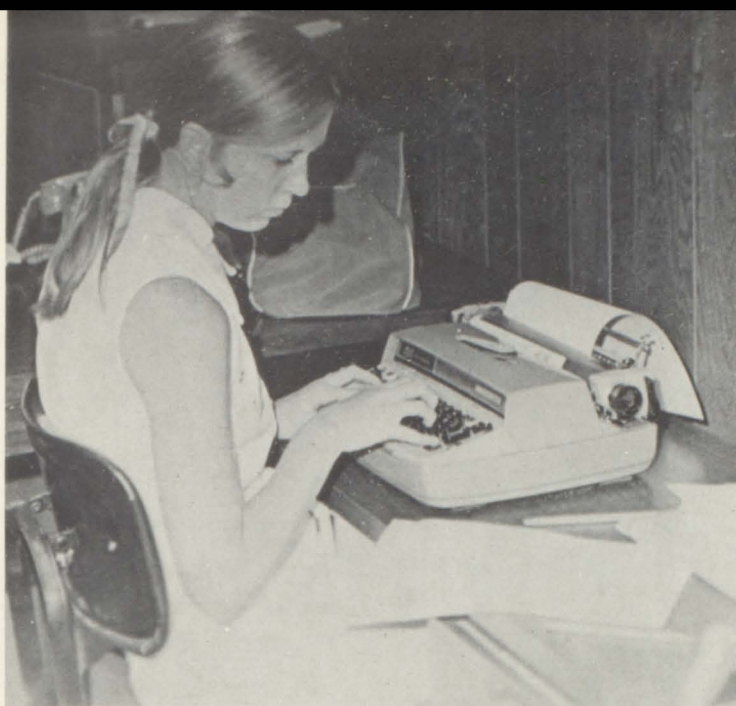

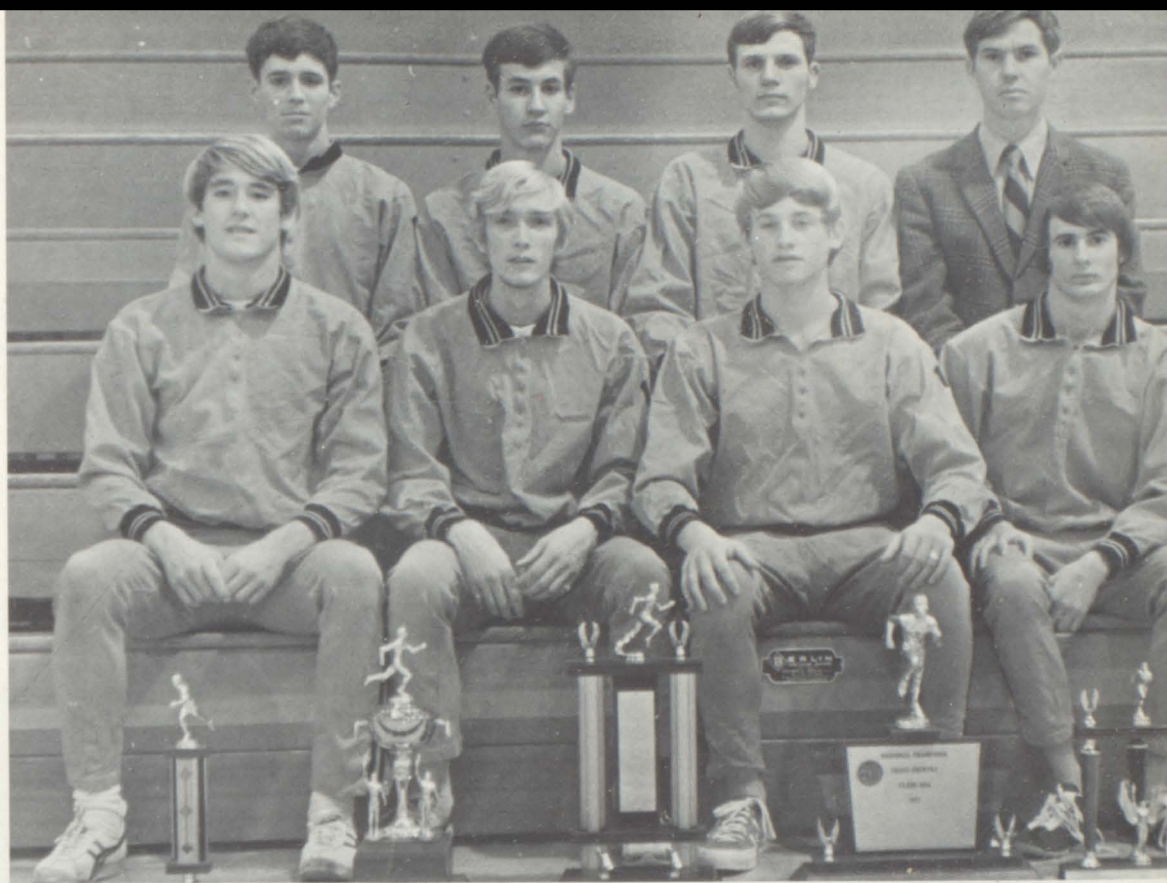
# Cross Country

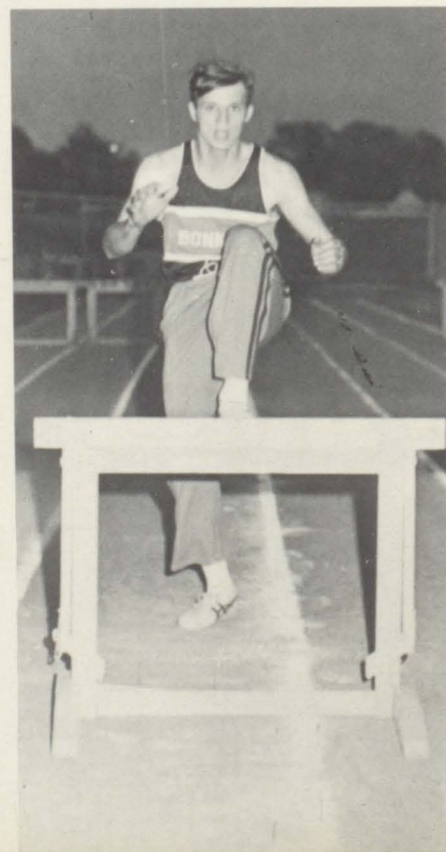

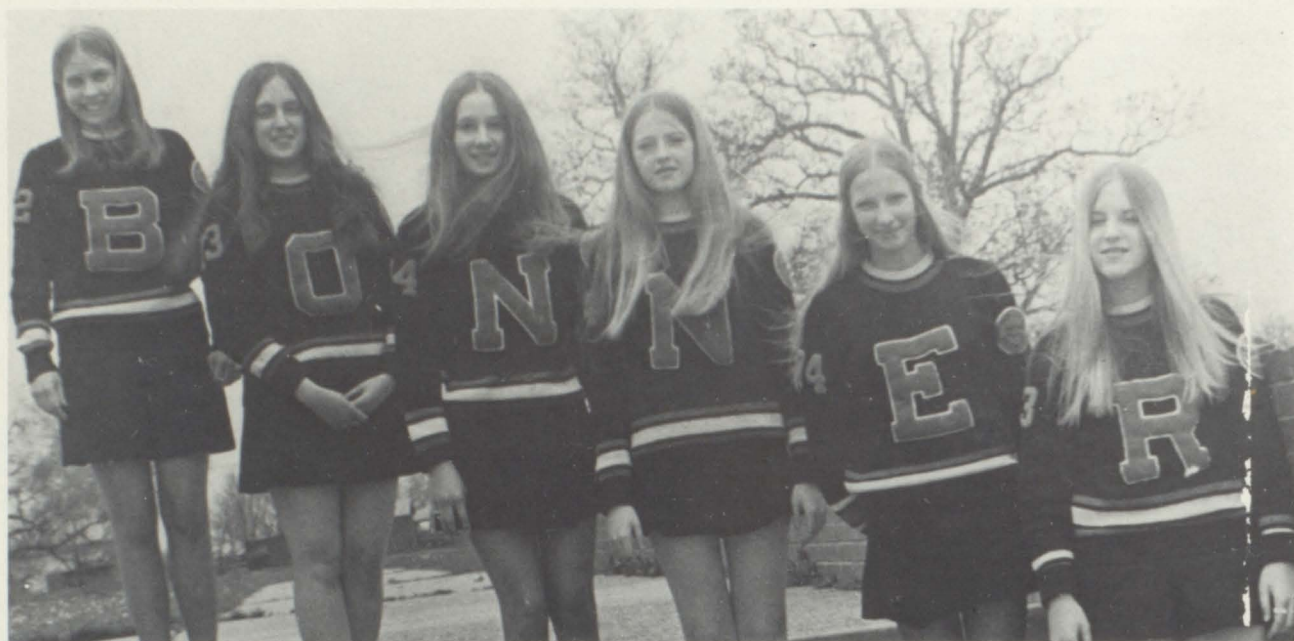

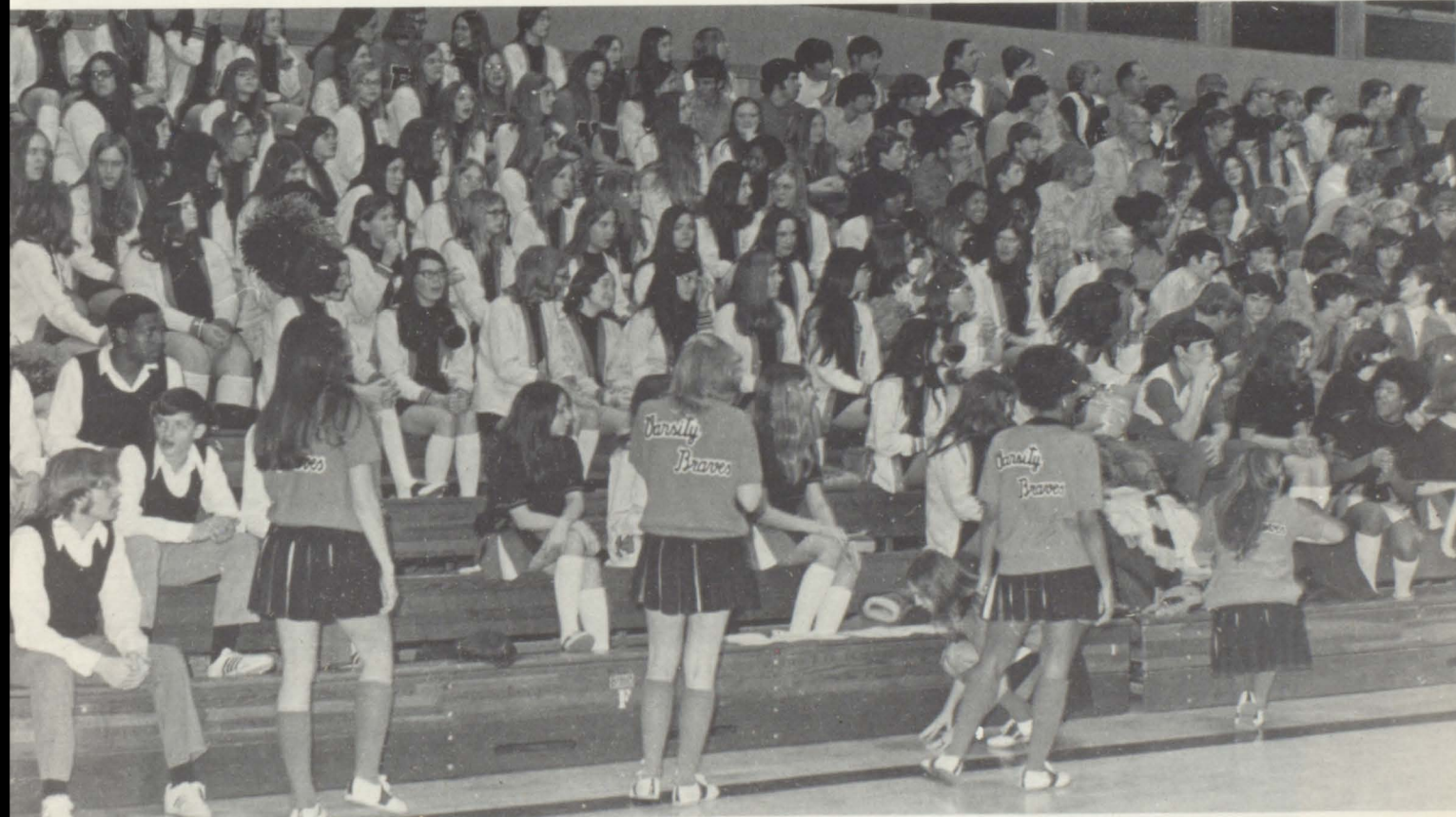

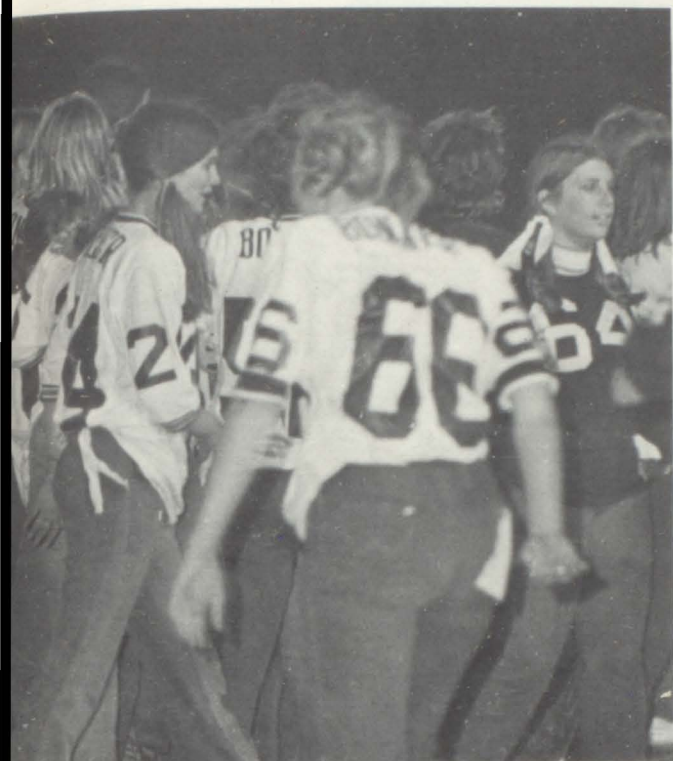

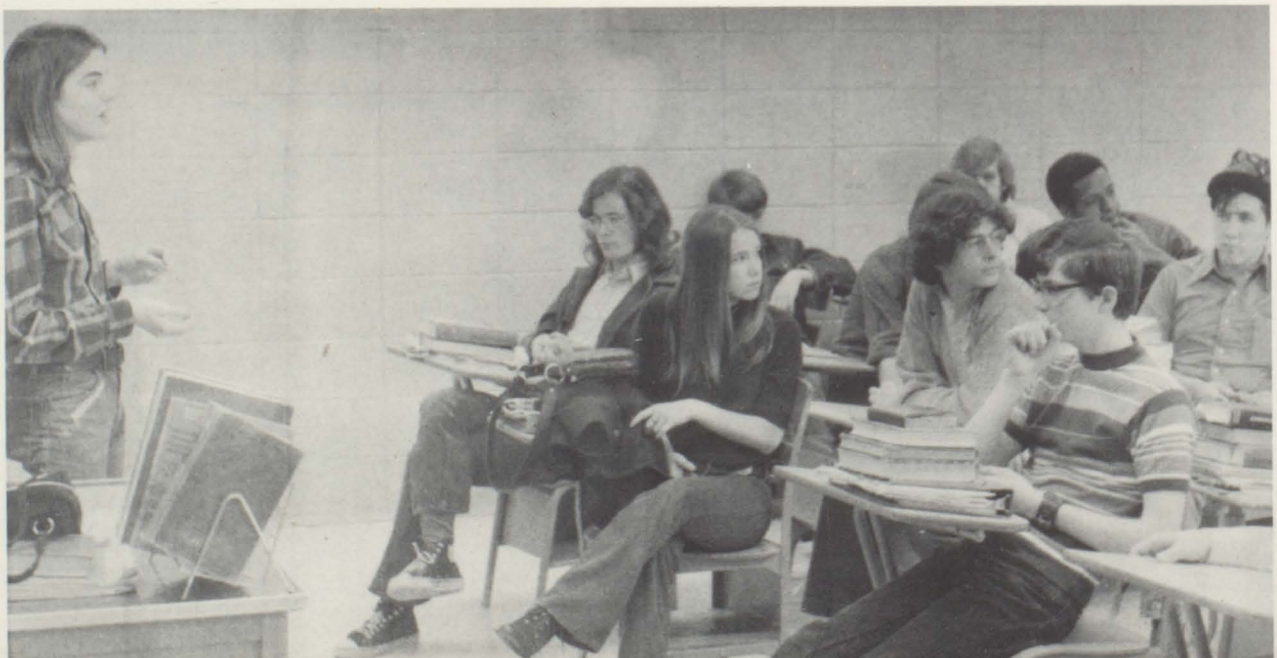

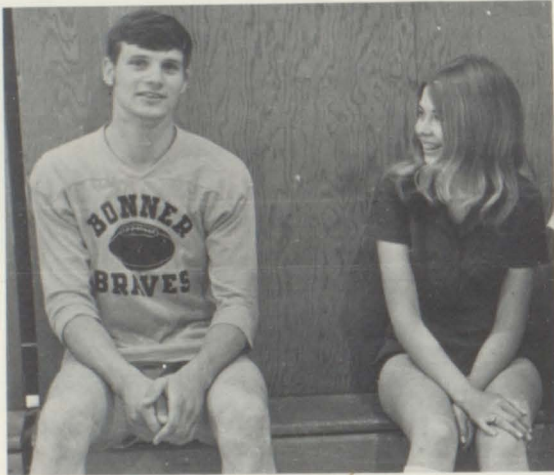

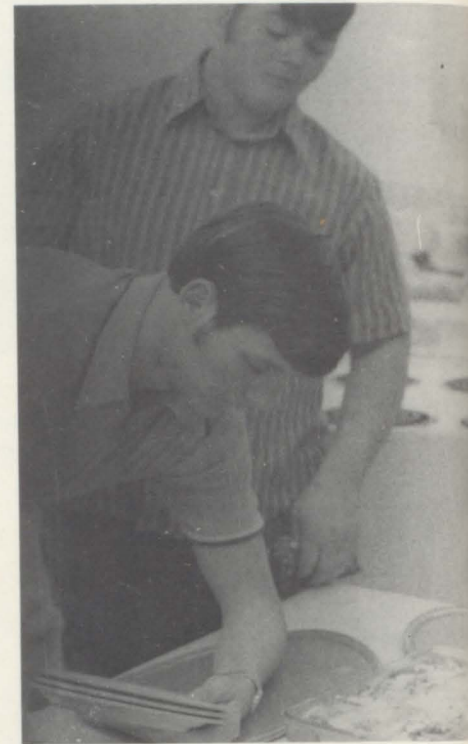

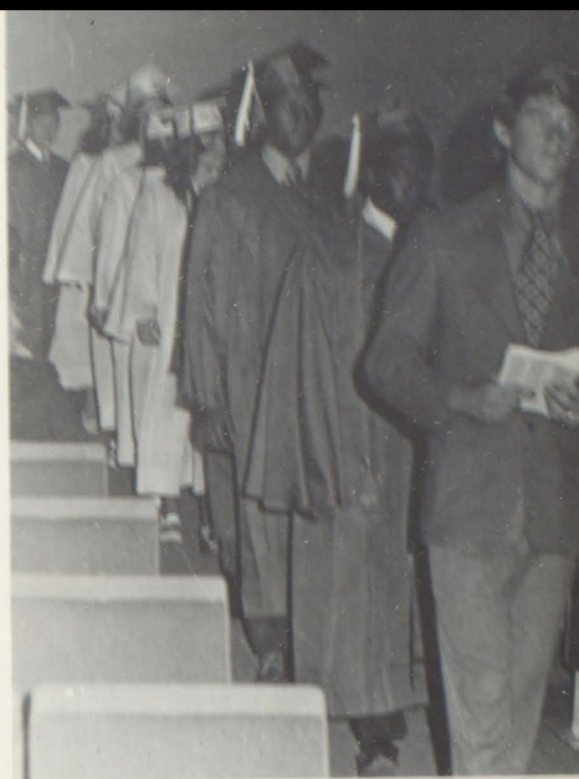

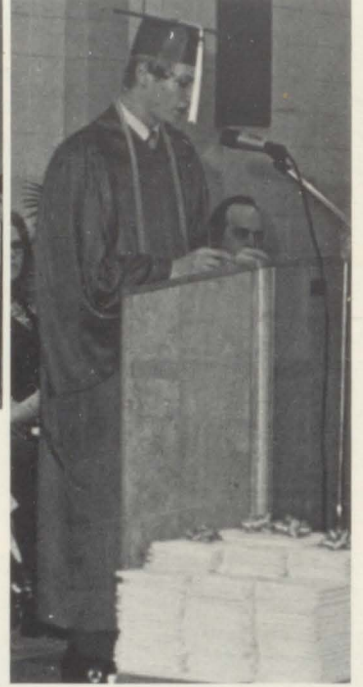

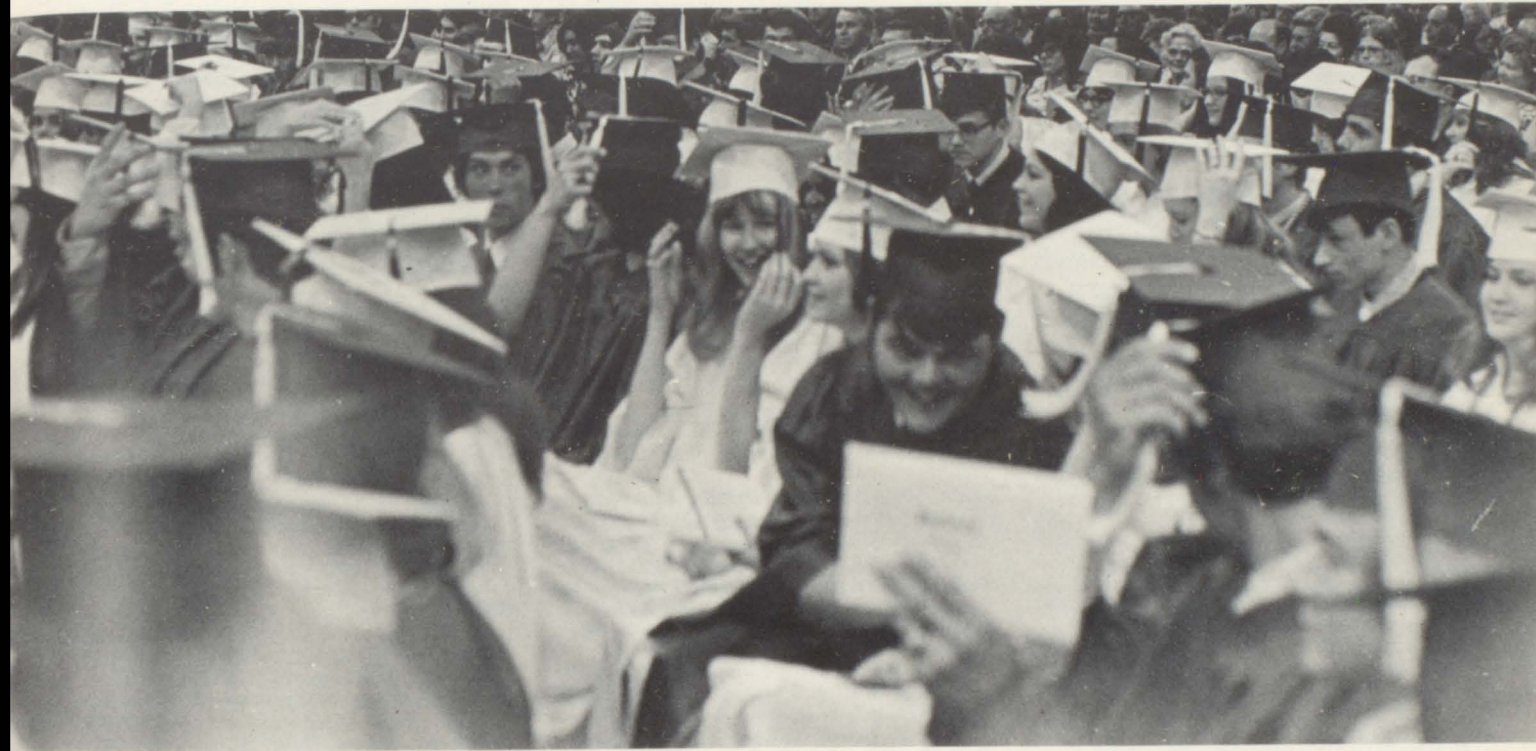
